## **UWE Bristol Community Fund Criteria**

The UWE Bristol Community Fund awards grants of up to £3,000 for community partnership projects which help to achieve the following aims:

- Supporting the development of partnership working between UWE students and staff and local community organisations.
- Increasing mutually beneficial relationships between staff, students and local communities.
- Developing opportunities for students to volunteer in the local community, whilst at the same time enhancing their teamwork, communication and project management skills.
- Developing opportunities to enhance student learning through practical, community-based projects (including projects within the curriculum).
- Developing projects which will have significant impact for the Bristol city and region.

## Who is eligible to apply?

Applications must be led by a current UWE student or staff member, and identify a lead community partner. The community partner should be involved in development of the application. If you have a good idea and are seeking a suitable community partner, the UWE Volunteering team can help with this.

We define 'community organisations' as non-profit making, so this could include the local authority for example, but it would exclude funding any activity for commercial purposes.

## What kinds of projects will we fund?

You can apply to the Community Fund to help establish NEW projects which involve UWE students in activities which will have a positive impact on the local community, while enhancing student learning and development of skills.

Student involvement can take any of these forms:

- Student-led volunteering projects outside of the curriculum
- Volunteering projects linked to a relevant curriculum area
- Student community-based learning projects embedded within a programme of study

We will give priority to projects within the following areas of focus:

- Schools and Education UWE students working with young people in areas with low progression into HE, for example through developing activities that can be delivered through Children's University
- **Sustainability** building on the tremendous impact that UWE students had on Bristol's year as European Green Capital through engagement with a wide range of community-based sustainability initiatives
- **Tackling inequality** working with charities and community groups in key neighbourhoods in Bristol

The application is expected to respond to each of the following six criteria and will be assessed against them by a panel who decide on how to spend the funds.

1.	Partnership	<ul> <li>The project is equally driven by university and community partners</li> <li>Learning for all partners is identified</li> </ul>
2.	Benefit local communities	<ul> <li>The project is clearly owned or seen as important by identifiable community networks, organisations or communities of interest</li> </ul>
3.	Student engagement	• Applications should be able to show how they will engage students in delivery of the project work, and create opportunities that will be attractive and meaningful for students
4.	Student learning and development	• Applications should be able to demonstrate how students will learn through engagement in the project, either through links to a relevant curriculum area or development of skills such as teamwork, communication and project management
5.	Long term prospects	<ul> <li>Applications should show a connection with and/or development of an area of expertise within the university and community organisation</li> <li>Applications should demonstrate how the project will be sustainable and/or leave a legacy</li> </ul>
6.	Value for money	• Are the costs reasonable and proportionate to the potential impact and number of students engaged?

## How much money is available?

You can apply for funds up to £3,000.

You will need to submit a budget as part of the application, which should detail resources required under the following headings:

- Venue hire/meeting space
- Travel and subsistence (including for volunteers)
- Printing of materials/publicity
- Equipment
- Training costs
- Costs incurred by community partner (including people's time)

We cannot fund the cost of salaries or time of UWE staff and students, or consultancy fees, etc.

A reasonable proportion of the budget should be committed to the costs incurred by the community partner, and paid directly to the community partner. This can include people's time working directly for the community partner, recognising that these resources are often a barrier to community organisations participating in partnership projects.

Please note that £3,000 is the standard funding limit, rather than a maximum you should aim for. Your budget should realistically reflect the costs required for the project and we also welcome applications under this limit.

If your project will cost more than £3,000 you can apply to the Community Fund to part-fund the project together with funding from other sources. Your application should indicate where additional funding will come from, and whether this funding is guaranteed.

Successful applicants will be required to do the following:

- Complete a feedback form and supply photos which can be used to create case studies
- Submit all receipts for all purchases
- Credit the UWE Bristol Fund in any publicity of the project
