Before you start

We are looking forward to welcoming you in the week commencing 15 September for Starting Block and the beginning of your programme. Starting block runs for the first two weeks, which will give you plenty of time to familiarise yourself with the campus, the staff, the facilities, to meet your course mates and make some new friends, and to make sure you have everything ready and set up before classes start the week after. But it will include a range of sessions with me, the academic team, and some of our professional services colleagues, designed to introduce you to UWE, to get you going on our digital platforms and systems, to begin to develop some skills crucial to success on your course – basically to begin to bridge that gap between what has come before and what university has to offer you.

Once you have satisfied all admissions requirements, we'll send you your login details for our IT systems to enable you to activate your university email account. Once your account has been activated, you'll gain access to the [MYUWE](#) platform where you can register. Note that your login details for MYUWE are different to those used for the UWE Welcome website. Registration for September programmes will only be open from August onwards. Engage with your programme

Start your learning

There are a couple of things that you might like to have a look at before you start at UWE:

- Have a read through your college or further education notes a few weeks before you arrive. Everyone experiences "summer syndrome" where we begin to forget what we finished learning only a few months before. So it really does help prevent the jump to university education seem chasm-like if you take a little time to remind yourself that you *do* already have the foundations for the learning to come by revisiting the material that led you here. There are a number of portals, dashboards, and interfaces you will use while a student at UWE. Some you will use to access your learning materials and submit your assignments. Some you will use to see your confirmed grades or access your timetable. And some you will use to conduct your work, store your files, and communicate. This short video on [Getting Started Online as a UWE Student](#) will help you. The degree programme is accredited by the Institute of Biomedical Science (IBMS). This means that an external body, the IBMS, have approved and validated our course as one appropriate academically for those interested in becoming an NHS Biomedical Scientist. Read around your subject

We do not recommend you purchase any textbooks before starting at UWE. There is an electronic reading list for each module that you will be taking. These lists will be provided once you begin your studies, and many of the texts are available in electronic form.

If you do find any interesting news articles, you might like to jot down some keywords and see whether you can find additional information from your school/college books or from online sources available to you. Once you have registered at UWE, you will have full access to the online search engines, textbooks and journals that are held in the University library.

Get equipped

The University has computers on all our campuses for you to use during your studies. These provide access to our core digital learning tools and any specialist software required for your course. You may have scheduled sessions in computer labs or other specialist facilities, and you will be able to use open-access PCs for self-study.

UWE Bristol licenses many specialist software packages for use on personal laptops for the duration of your course. If you're struggling to meet the financial demands of your course, please contact the [Student Money Service](#) team for advice and guidance.

The core software used in your course includes UWE's core digital education systems (Blackboard, Collaborate, Panopto, Microsoft 365 (formerly Office 365), PebblePad).

Microsoft 365 will run in almost any operating system or device (laptop, desktop, tablet, phone). But some others of these packages will run fine on Windows and usually Mac devices, sometimes not on tablets or Chromebooks. We recommend that you have access to a Windows based system with the following minimum specifications: [Core Specification](#).

PLEASE NOTE: Laboratory coats for practical classes will be provided for all sessions, so you do not need to purchase or provide your own coat.
