Before you start

We are looking forward to welcoming you in the week commencing 15 September for Starting Block and the beginning of your programme.

Starting Block will help you settle into university and to help you get to know your teaching team and course mates. We will help you find your way around, get used to our systems, and practise the skills you need to make a strong start. Your <u>timetable</u> will be available to you via MYUWE (login required) once you have started the registration process. Please visit the <u>'Understanding your teaching timetable'</u> website to find out when your timetable will be published.

Preparing and arrival

Registration

Once you have satisfied all admissions requirements, we'll send you your login details for our IT systems to enable you to activate your university email account. Once your account has been activated, you'll gain access to the <u>MYUWE</u> platform where you can register. Note that your login details for MYUWE are different to those used for the UWE Welcome website. Registration for September programmes will only be open from August onwards. Start your learning

At UWE Politics and IR, we are very proud of our lively and engaged community of learners and we are absolutely thrilled to have you join us! We have also prepared an exercise to welcome you into the UWE Politics and IR community.

What makes you passionate about Politics and International Relations? What are you looking forward to learning and experiencing the most in our programme? Please, before joining us at the Starting Block, bring a picture to show (on your phone) that captures your very first "political memory". A political memory is a memory of an event, a film, a conversation you had with someone or just a thing (like an art piece) that first made you aware of the importance of politics in your life. The exercise is simple and is intended to give us, your lecturers, a chance to start to get to know you. This work aims to form the focus for your first personal tutor meeting.

Academic Personal Tutor (APT)

During the Starting Block, you will meet your Academic Personal Tutor (APT) and fellow students on the course. Your APT will be a member of staff who will have access to information on your performance and profile, allowing them to effectively support your personal and academic development. APTs are the cornerstone of pastoral care. Your tutor will be there to encourage you to be able to reflect on your progress on your course and identify where they believe you need support. They can then provide that support or direct you to other appropriate support within the University. Your APT will be keen to find out more about you, your past experiences and your dreams and aspirations.

Read around your subject

Before starting at UWE Bristol, you will no doubt be keen to start learning more about Politics and International Relations, especially if you have not studied these subjects before. Here are some recommendations for your summer readings.

Every one of our students has free access to <u>Kanopy</u> a streaming service for educational institutions that provides access to over 18,000 films, including major blockbusters and documentaries. Here is the Campus Collection for <u>Political Science</u>. Some real gems in there could help illustrate some of the issues you will study throughout your degree.

Have you heard of <u>Thought in Action?</u> It is a partnership between the Watershed and UWE Philosophy and Politics programmes which fosters conversations about cinema. The project provides an opportunity for audiences to engage in deeper conversations about issues and



ideas arising from films in our programme. Keep an eye out for the next instalment of our partnership.

There are also two introductory books you could buy, each of which gives you a good grounding into things – and we will use these (or similar books) in two of your introductory modules also:

You can also bookmark, and read, <u>E-International Relations</u> – which is run from within our team. In addition, we suggest you try and keep well informed about current political events by reading and watching high-quality media sources and podcasts.

Each of your modules will have a dedicated reading list, which is regularly updated and will be made available at the beginning of the new academic year.

Connect with others

Members of staff engage in a wide range of scholarly activities, from writing books and articles to speaking at public events and writing in the media.

We also have a very active student society Politics and IR Society (<u>PAIRS</u>) that youwill be welcome to join. We take the student experience and student's voice seriously at UWE politics and IR. You might want to familiarise yourself with services available to you such as the <u>Students Union</u>, <u>Peer Assisted Learning</u> (PAL), <u>Student Ambassadors</u>, and other <u>Student Societies</u>, <u>Sports Clubs and Teams</u>, <u>Volunteering</u>, <u>Going Global</u>, etc.

One of the central goals of our programme is to prepare our students with the proper knowledge and experience to make a difference in the world. To that end, we have built a strong networking community on <u>LinkedIn</u>, which you are welcome to join if you have a profile already. You might also want to check the <u>Career Toolkit</u> or get in touch with our <u>Student Success Coach</u>, who is there to help you find and prepare yourself for your dream job.
