Starting Block will help you settle into university and help you get to know your teaching team and course mates. Start your learning

In advance of starting your Programme, you might also find it useful to have a look at some of the following:

- 1. You are going to earn a degree in International Management, so it is important to understand the management challenges associated with developing strategies and managing the operations of companies whose activities stretch across national boundaries. Prof. Dr. Stefan Schmid, Professor of International Management and Strategic Management, attempts to answer the question: What does International Management mean for you? in this short YouTube clip.
- 2. Strategy is essential for businesses and there are plenty of materials (books, articles, videos, etc.) available for you to read or watch to understand the fundamental concepts. One of the popular text books that we strongly recommend you read in advance of the start of your programme, is from Robert M. Grant and Judith J. Jordan, 'Foundations of Strategy (published by Wiley)'. The book gives a good overview and introduction to Strategic Analysis.

Read around your subject

A key skill which is required for those aiming for a high level of success within their chosen profession is the ability to think critically about key issues and debates. In order to develop these skills, you should start to read around your subject before you arrive.

When you get to University, there will be recommended text books which will cover the syllabus. In the meantime, if you fancy some light reading to inspire you, have a look at the following resources:

- 1. Operations Management is essential for successful functioning of any organisation. The book from David Barnes is a good source. Here's the full reference: Barnes, D. (2018), "Operations management: an international perspective", Palgrave, London.
- 2. Service Concept defines the how and what of service design and helps mediate between customer needs and an organization's strategic intent. This short blog <u>Understanding</u> the service concept on LinkedIn sums up this idea very simply.
- 3. Research is an integral part of academic studies and in fact you will need to complete a dissertation to earn this degree. Some of you may have prior experience from your undergraduate studies and some of you may be quite new to this. You can start exploring why and what this is all about by following this link which will give you some basic ideas about research methods:

The accounting and finance function concerns controlling and monitoring the financial performance of an organisation and communicating this information to interested parties such as directors, managers, investors, creditors, lenders and the public at large. London: Sage.* This book will allow you to keep up with the various set readings for each of the topics that will be covered during the module. You can also refer to Management is (still) not Leadership. In this short but classic piece, John Kotter outlines the main differences between management and leadership, and explains how we might best learn the skills of good leadership practice.
- 6. Project management has become a vehicle in operations in a variety of industries including construction, financial services, telecommunication, IT etc. As companies are facing demanding customers and fierce competitions in global arena, project management has become an effective tool to respond to opportunities, threats and challenges. - 7. An exponential growth in technological competence, with the regular advent of new technologies, has encouraged both the capacity of businesses to reach new audiences as well as enhanced expectations of those audiences to be discerning in their choices. It is clear that digital facets of businesses are today the single obvious façade through which trade happens. At the same time success and failure in digital business can be nuanced and have its own characteristics.
