Before you start

We are looking forward to welcoming you in the week commencing 15 September for Starting Block and the beginning of your programme. Starting Block will help you settle into university and get to know your teaching team and course mates. We will help you find your way around, get used to our systems, and practice the skills you need to make a strong start. Registration

Once you have satisfied all admissions requirements, we'll send you your login details for our IT systems to enable you to activate your university email account. Once your account has been activated, you'll gain access to the [MYUWE](#) platform where you can register. Note that your login details for MYUWE are different to those used for the UWE Welcome website. Registration for September programmes will only be open from August onwards. Engage with your programme

Start your learning

Have a go at these activities to start preparing for your programme and induction:

- Visit the UWE Bristol website, find the pages for the School of Creative and Cultural Industries, and look up the English Literature staff: they will be teaching you, they will be your **Academic Personal Tutors**, and you will generally be seeing them around. It's good to know the faces in advance!
- Visit the UWE Bristol Library pages to find out about all the services the [Library](#) offers. Then have a go at using the Library search tool (for example by searching for critical work on your favourite author or book). Good research is crucial to your academic success and it benefits from practise.

Read around your subject

It is important that, as an English Literature student, you have opinions about novels, poems, plays, authors and so on, so do read widely over the summer to develop your literary tastes and critical approaches to literature. Think about why you might enjoy some texts but not others and be prepared to articulate the reasons once our course starts. Consider using the summer to complete some of the set reading for your course. We hope you will enjoy these texts, as well as giving yourself a head start in your studies.

The core modules for your course are **Approaches to Literature and Criticism** and **Literature and the Marketplace**, running for the first term. The texts below are core reading used extensively in class, so these would be a great place to begin reading. It will be helpful to get the recommended edition of each one, but you can use a different edition if needed:

As you read, think of these five questions:

1. Who is telling the story and whose perspective are we given? Who is speaking and who is seeing? How does this affect the plot, structure, and reader experience?
2. Can you recognise what genre these texts belong to and what the conventions of the genre might be?
3. How different is the experience of reading a play from that of reading a novel? And how different is the experience of reading a play from seeing it performed on stage?
4. Do you think these are “great books”? Why/why not?

A key skill which is required to achieve a high level of success within your chosen programme is the ability to think critically about key issues and practices. To help you to enhance these skills and be ready to engage with your studies, you should start to read and research around your subject before you arrive. Explore the [Library](#) web pages to see the wide range of resources available to you once you become a UWE Bristol student.
