# **Before you start**

We are looking forward to welcoming you in the week commencing 15 September for Starting Block and the beginning of your programme.

# Engage with your programme

**Start your learning** – the **Summer Preparation Project** tasks should be completed during the summer and be ready for the first day:

## Introductory Task 1:

Bring in on first taught day of module

While teaching the alphabet to children, teachers and parents often make use of ABC books or posters to communicate complex ideas in a simple manner. These are called ABC primers.

Usually with ABC primers, letters are connected to words: A is for Apple, B is for Ball, etc. But taken as a complete set of 26 letters, cultural and social settings can be explored and a defined set of ideas can be presented. It is also interesting to see how learning a language is connected to ideas depending on where the primer is devised and for who – which is one of the reasons why the International Phonetic NATO alphabet (Alpha, Bravo, Charlie, etc.) was hard to develop and had so many different variations.

# This assignment tasks you with creating your own ABC primer and design it, either as a booklet, set of individual pages/images or motion piece.

#### Size and format are up to you.

If created as a moving/motion piece, please ensure you provide a link to your work (upload to vimeo/youtube/other) and provide us with support printouts of the work.

You could explore a personal interest (architecture, film, politics, science) or else look to make a cultural/social commentary as was done by the poet Lucille Clifton when she created <u>*The*</u><u>*Black BC's*</u>, where a poem for each letter of the alphabet introduced contributions by significant black people from American history and culture or <u>*A is for Activist*</u>, an ABC board book written and illustrated for the next generation of progressives
