Before you start

We are looking forward to welcoming you in the Fashion Textiles Studio on Monday 15 September for Starting Block and the beginning of your programme.

Starting Block will help you settle into university and the Programme and help you get to know your teaching team and course mates. We will help you find your way around, get used to our systems, and organise your inductions into the main Studio and Workshop areas you'll be working in. Your timetable will be available to you via MYUWE (login required) once you have started the registration process. Your main Studio Teaching days will be Mondays and Tuesdays, and you will have Inductions and taught Workshops on other days during the week. Engage with your programme.

Start your learning – Please complete these tasks which we will review when you start in September.

Task 1: The T-Shirt brief // One of the first things we do with all new Students in Starting Block is organise a Photoshoot with the Outcomes of this Summer project. It's a great way for you to get to know each other and to celebrate the very different responses we get to the Brief.

From its origins as men's underwear to its complex role in modern fashion, the T- Shirt is one of the most universally worn items of clothing. Cheap, utilitarian, and comfortable, the T-Shirt has become an essential basic wardrobe item worn by people of all social classes and ages.

The 1960s saw it go from street fashion to haute couture in the collections of such designers as Pierre Balmain and Christian Dior, and then to a political tool in the 1970's and 80's through the work of Designers such as Vivienne Westwood and Katherine Hammet. Fast forward to the 2020's and the T-Shirt is widely used as an example in the narrative about Fashion's impact on the environment.

No matter which way you look at it – the simple but iconic T-Shirt is a vehicle for individual, social and cultural communication.

For this task we would like you to re-work, transform and add-value an existing T- Shirt*. You might want to completely re-imagine its basic shape using your Pattern Cutting skills, or to combine it with other materials / garments / garment parts to develop a new silhouette. You might choose to reinvent its surface through embellishment, print and surface design – or you might be inspired by the use of text, objects, cut outs or even by its life cycle as a consumer object – it is completely up to you.

We encourage you to be inventive, playful and creative. Your designs could be subtle interventions, radical propositions or magnificent spectacles.....

We will review all the Summer work in the first week.

***Please do not buy a new T-Shirt for this project – use one you already own or source second hand from a charity shop.**

Task 2 // Garment Drawing Brief - Develop a body of 30 drawings of garments.

These may be garments in yours or your friends / families wardrobes, or garments in museums / galleries. They can be whole garments, or garment details such as interesting pockets, collars, cuffs or shapes. They might have interesting print or embellishment on them, or may be knitted or made from unusual materials.

Experiment with the way that you communicate the fabrics, textures, drape, technical details and construction of the garment. Try out different media and drawing styles and try to capture as much information as you can. You can use any media you like - pens and pencils, to collage,

tape, inks, watercolours, collage, markers – etc, and your drawings can be anything from loose and playful sketches through to resolved technical drawings it's up to you ...

You can use any size sketchbook for this, but we recommend nothing smaller than A4.

Task 3 // Read and Listen around your subject

A key skill which is required to achieve a high level of success within your chosen programme is the ability to think critically about key issues and practices affecting Fashion and our interactions with it. To help you to enhance these skills and be ready to engage with your studies, you should start to read and research around your subject before you arrive.
