Programme Leaders

Before you start

We are looking forward to welcoming you in the week commencing 15 September for Starting Block and the beginning of your programme.

Starting Block will help you settle into university and to help you get to know your teaching team and course mates. We will help you find your way around, get used to our systems, and practice the skills you need to make a strong start. Look out for further emails and explore the Starting Block website with more details.

Your <u>timetable</u> will be available to you via MYUWE (login required) once you have started the registration process. Please visit the <u>'Understanding your teaching timetable'</u> website to find out when your timetable will be published.

Preparing and arrival

Registration

Once you have satisfied all admissions requirements, we'll send you your login details for our IT systems to enable you to activate your university email account. Once your account has been activated, you'll gain access to the MYUWE platform where you can register. Note that your login details for MYUWE are different to those used for the UWE Welcome website. Registration for September programmes will only be open from August onwards. You can find guidance and further information on our Registration website.

ID card - upload your photo now

We can only print your ID card if you have added your photo to <u>MYUWE</u>. To avoid delays, upload your photo as soon as you receive login details. For help, go to our <u>student card guidance</u>.

Engage with your programme

Start your learning

Immediately after your induction week you will be straight into timetabled course activities. To keep your photography active over the summer period we would like you to produce work to the *Transition* brief outlined below; you will make a short presentation of your images to a small tutorial group in the first teaching week after the induction process.

TRANSITION - Level 1 Summer Project brief – September 2025

Your first year of practical photography projects will involve responding to assignment briefs that will enable you to explore the photographic image across four disciplines of the medium (studio practice, analogue photography, moving image and book/zine publication). Within these assignments, you will have the latitude to begin the process of exploring subjects that are important to you and the way you see your practice evolving. To start the process, we are setting you a short summer project:

- 1. We want to you to take the word 'Transition' and produce a creative response that will be presented on a single sheet of A3 paper.
- 2. Define what the word might mean to you and consider how you might engage with subjects/ideas that interest you research into them to try and understand them more deeply.
- 3. You can produce any kind of visual response; a single image or a series of photographs printed as a diptych or triptych, a collage of images (and text) taken from different sources or a 'typological' study, an abstraction or something more descriptive.
- 4. The image(s) can work in any photographic genre, including Documentary, Portraiture, Landscape, Still Life or Interiors. As an example, the first image in the Summer Project assignment link below, by Lorenzo Vitturi, is taken from a body of work that explores the changing nature of the area of Dalston in London. Through collections of portraits, landscapes and still life images of sculptures constructed from objects bought from the local Ridley Road market, Vitturi constructs a picture of a place and a community in transition, affected by property development and demographic shift.

Bring your work to your first timetabled session on campus so that we are able to print it out and we will then produce a 'pop-up' exhibition in the gallery space at Bower Ashton.

Be prepared

Access support

Get equipped

The Photography Department carries a wide range of technical resources and equipment; therefore we suggest that students do not invest in expensive photography equipment prior to joining the programme.

We do recommend that all students back-up all of their practical digital work to their own hard drive. It is suggested that students should purchase a robust portable hard drive with a minimum 1TB storage capacity. Many lecture and seminar rooms operate a Windows PC platform, whilst our production studios are predominantly Apple Mac based, the technical instruction team will be happy to help with any formatting issues.

The University has computers on all our campuses for you to use during your studies. These provide access to our core digital learning tools and any specialist software required for your course. You may have scheduled sessions in computer labs or other specialist facilities, and you will be able to use open-access PCs for self-study.

You will benefit from a laptop, particularly if your access to on-campus facilities is limited. UWE Bristol licenses many specialist software packages for use on personal laptops for the duration of your course. If you're struggling to meet the financial demands of your course, please contact the Student Money Service team for advice and guidance. See the UWE website for detailed information on choosing your IT equipment including recommended specifications.

We recommend that you purchase a device with the **Intensive Specification** for running software from the Adobe Creative suite, such as Photoshop and InDesign. The higher your RAM storage, the faster your computer will run software.

The core software used in your course includes:

• **Key software packages** — Alongside image production software from the Adobe Creative Suite, including Photoshop, Lightroom, InDesign and Premier, you will also use word processing and presentation software, such as Microsoft Word and PowerPoint. These packages will run on Windows and Mac devices, but Adobe software will not work effectively on tablets or Chromebooks.
