## Before you start

We are looking forward to welcoming you in the week commencing 15 September for Starting Block and the beginning of your programme.

Starting Block will help you settle into university and to help you get to know your teaching team and course mates. We will help you find your way around, get used to our systems, and practice the skills you need to make a strong start. Look out for further emails and explore the Starting Block website with more details.

Your <u>timetable</u> will be available to you via MYUWE (login required) once you have started the registration process. Please visit the <u>'Understanding your teaching timetable'</u> website to find out when your timetable will be published.

There will be induction sessions between 13.00 and 17.00 on 18 and 25 September. They will include details of facilities and support for you as a student at UWE; workshops on the digital technologies we will be using in the delivery of the programme and an outline of the programme for the year.

#### Registration

Once you have satisfied all admissions requirements, we'll send you your login details for our IT systems to enable you to activate your university email account. Once your account has been activated, you'll gain access to the MYUWE platform where you can register. Note

that your login details for MYUWE are different to those used for the UWE Welcome website. Registration for September programmes will only be open from August onwards. You can find guidance and further information on our <u>Registration</u> website.

#### **ID** cards

We can only print your ID card if you have added your photo to <u>MYUWE</u>. To avoid delays, upload your photo as soon as you receive login details. For help, go to our <u>student card</u> <u>quidance</u>.

## How to make a successful start to your programme

You will have already been informed about our additional requirements which must be completed ahead of registration and induction:

- Academic certificates
- Confirmation you will be working/volunteering in an appropriate setting

## **Engage with your programme**

### Start your learning

Please email me the completed activity designed to help you prepare for your programme. Aspects of which you will be asked to share at induction:

This initial task is a way of me (the programme lead) getting to know you a little better and will help you get back into the swing of academic writing. Therefore, please ensure your submission demonstrates a good level of English in line with level 3 undergraduate study and adhere to academic conventions such as referencing if appropriate. It should be no longer than a single page of A4 in font size 12. It should be submitted before the first induction session on Thursday 18 September 2025. The writing should include:

- 1. How you've got here (name, professional role length of service and whether paid or voluntary, qualification for entry to the top up eg. the name of your Foundation degree, or other highest qualification)
- 2. The most recent assignment or project which has been your highest grade / proudest achievement. Explain why you think you were particularly successful on this occasion and what you have learned that you can build upon this year.
- 3. Which learning theory has been the most relevant so far and / or the most significant in your professional role and why? Reference any appropriate sources.
- 4. What areas of interest in your professional role are you looking to explore / considering for your final research dissertation? Give a summary of the ideas you have considered over the summer. What, if anything, have you read which may be useful to your idea?

#### Read around your subject

A key skill which is required to achieve a high level of success within your chosen programme is the ability to think critically about key issues and practices. To help you to enhance these skills and be ready to engage with your studies, you should start to read and research around your subject before you arrive. Explore the <u>Library</u> web pages to see the wide range of resources available to you once you become a UWE Bristol student.

It is therefore a good idea to read the Times Education Supplement (TES) and/or the Education Guardian weekly to keep up to date with educational issues.

There isn't a course textbook but much of the focus for this year will be undertaking research to complete your dissertation. The textbook we use is:

It would be beneficial to obtain/gain access to this book and begin to make notes before the programme starts.
